

HIGHLIGHTS FROM 2023

ADVOCATING FOR STRONGER ANIMAL AND ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION LAWS

In 2023, we were active in engaging the public and the government through our advocacy efforts, including:

DEFENDING ANIMALS AGAINST INHUMANE PRACTICES

We took a bold stand against the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry's proposal to issue licenses for new train and trial areas in Ontario. These are areas where wildlife are kept captive for the purposes of training dogs for hunting and conducting hunting dog competitions. We submitted comments urging the Ministry to withdraw the proposal and proceed with the initial plan to phase out Train and Trial Areas due to the negative impacts it has on wildlife and their habitats and the inhumane and unethical nature of the hunting practice.

SHAPING CANADA'S BIODIVERSITY STRATEGY

In response to the Government of Canada's call for input to guide them in developing a national biodiversity strategy, AEL Advocacy provided crucial recommendations. Our input emphasized the interconnected well-being of humans, animals, and the environment, ensuring a comprehensive approach in shaping the 2030 National Biodiversity Strategy.

ENDING THE TRADE OF ELEPHANT IVORY AND RHINO HORN


AEL Advocacy rallied behind Canada's initiative to amend the Wild Animal and Plant Trade Regulations to prohibit the elephant ivory and rhino horn trade. We submitted comments calling for swift implementation accompanied by robust monitoring, auditing, and enforcement measures. In a landmark decision in November 2023, the Government of Canada officially passed the amendments, banning the import and export of hunting trophies containing elephant tusks or rhino horns. The changes are set to come into effect on January 8th. 2024.

RESISTING AG-GAG LEGISLATION

Standing firm in our commitment to transparency in our food system, we opposed Bill C-275, a federal ag-gag style bill, by submitting a brief to the House of Commons Standing Committee on Agriculture and Agri-Food. Our comments emphasized the potential negative impacts on transparency, animal welfare, environmental sustainability, human and animal health, and constitutional rights, urging the committee to abandon the bill entirely. Additionally, AEL Advocacy stood alongside Animal Justice, Jessica Scott-Reid, and Louise Jorgensen in challenging Ontario's ag-gag law, by participating in a rally of animal advocates dedicated to voicing concerns for those who cannot speak for themselves.

PUSHING FOR ENVIRONMENTAL LAW REFORM IN ANIMAL AGRICULTURE

In our quest to address the profound environmental consequences of factory farming, AEL Advocacy conducted a groundbreaking legislative review of pertinent Canadian and international laws. This comprehensive analysis, encapsulated in the report titled "Animal Agriculture and Environmental Protection: A Multi-Jurisdictional Legislative Review" included recommendations for legislative and policy reforms to better





address the environmental impacts of animal agriculture. An <u>in-depth article</u> about our report was published in the National, a Canadian Bar Association publication. We also co-hosted a <u>webinar</u> with World Animal Protection about the report, which was attended by government representatives, lawyers, animal and environmental groups, and rural residents fighting the expansion of factory farming in their communities.

FIGHTING FOR TRANSPARENCY IN OUR FOOD SYSTEM

In our unyielding pursuit of a transparent food system that prioritizes the well-being of animals, people, and the planet, AEL Advocacy made impactful strides:

EXPOSING GREENWASHING BY THE CANADIAN CATTLE ASSOCIATION

AEL Advocacy took a decisive stand against false sustainability claims made by the Canadian Cattle Association. Filing a false advertising complaint, we called for accountability and transparency in addressing misleading assertions about the environmental impact of beef, urging Ad Standards to retract these deceptive advertisements.



UNMASKING DECEPTION BY CHICKEN FARMERS CANADA

Challenging deceptive health and welfare claims by Chicken Farmers Canada, we filed a false advertising complaint against their ads on Reddit. AEL Advocacy exposed the disparity between their claims and actual practices, advocating for the withdrawal of these misleading ads to protect health and ethics-conscious consumers.

HOLDING POWER TO ACCOUNT IN ENVIRONMENTAL ENFORCEMENT

To ensure the effectiveness of environmental protection laws in Ontario's animal agriculture sector, AEL Advocacy submitted a freedom of information request with the Ministry of Environment, Conservation and Parks. Our forthcoming report in early 2024 will unveil the findings, holding authorities accountable for the enforcement of critical laws safeguarding our environment.

Enhancing Access to Justice in Animal and Environmental Law

At the heart of AEL Advocacy's mission is an unwavering commitment to forge a legal landscape that is accessible and just. Our tireless pursuit of this vision takes shape through various initiatives:

THE ANIMAL AND ENVIRONMENTAL LAW INQUIRY SERVICE

In February 2023, AEL Advocacy launched our free Animal and Environmental Law Inquiry Service to address the demand for accessible legal support. This service empowers individuals, communities, and organizations in Ontario by offering up to two hours of summary legal assistance to navigate animal and environmental protection-related issues. Our legal team, responding to diverse inquiries on topics such as humanewashing/greenwashing, pet custody disputes, land-

use planning, and ag-gag laws, provided dozens of hours of free summary advice in 2023.

Through our receipt of a LUSH Charity Pot Grant, we were able to expand our core capacity to handle inquiries, spread awareness of the service, and increase the volume of inquiries received each month. A portion of the funds provides freelance opportunities for law students, engaging them in these specialized areas of law early in their careers.

LEGAL REPRESENTATION

We extended free legal representation to clients in Ontario who would otherwise be unable to afford legal assistance. A notable example includes representing a member of Attawapiskat First Nation in filing a complaint with the United Nations Human Rights Council to expose Canada's persistent violations of fundamental rights to safe drinking water and sanitation in his community.

LEGAL RESEARCH AND CONSULTING SERVICES

This year, we provided crucial legal consulting services to non-profit organizations and businesses dedicated to animal and environmental protection Our efforts included providing essential support in scrutinizing the regulatory framework governing the reptile and amphibian trade, aiming to uncover how industry stakeholders sidestep existing regulations and spotlight potential weaknesses in the current legal system. Additionally, we conducted essential legal research on the applicability of the precautionary principle in relation to the impact of plastic pollution on wildlife.




Providing Accessible Public Legal Education



WEBINARS AND PRESENTATIONS

In 2023, AEL Advocacy hosted free webinars and presentations to educate the public on various topics in animal and environmental law, and provide important



information about the legal options available to address various animal or environmental law concerns. This year, we co-hosted a webinar with World Animal Protection Canada about our newly published report, "Animal Agriculture and Environmental Protection: A Multi-Jurisdictional Legislative Review." We also presented at the 5th annual Canadian Animal Law Conference at the University of Toronto, where we explained how to use existing environmental laws to tackle factory farming. We were also invited to provide a guest lecture on this topic at the University of Ottawa's Faculty of Law.


